





### Sustainable Tourism Policies & Strategies in the European Union

Concept and programme for an international summer school

(as of June 19, 2023)

This Blended Intensive Programme (BIP, 3 ECTS) on Master level will be organised each summer by a different European university that is part of the TRIANGLE Knowledge Alliance for sustainable tourism. It consists of a physical one-week course with a field trip and an additional online component. It will involve both student and staff mobility, with the potential to be funded by Erasmus, provided that at least three partner universities with a minimum of 15 participants attend. The course is also open for non-university participants interested in the topic.

The first classroom course will take place at Eberswalde University for Sustainable Development (HNEE), Germany, from June 19-23, 2023. There will be two additional days of online teaching, a preparatory day on June 13 and a day of group presentations and exams on June 28.

<u>Goals</u>: EU policies, strategies and funding programmes have a significant influence on (sustainable) tourism development in EU member countries, especially regarding destination management and the development of small and medium enterprises (SMEs). In addition, EU policies have an important regulatory function, e.g. regarding transport, Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) or biodiversity conservation. At the same time, EU structures, policies and funding programmes are complex and often difficult to comprehend. This summer school is supposed to shed light on EU structures and programmes and create an understanding how they shape (sustainable) tourism in its different dimensions in member states.

<u>Prerequisites</u>: This course is conceived for Master students who have tourism studies as their major or at least a background in tourism. Therefore, the course will not include an introduction to tourism. Ideally, students should also have studied, or have some background in *sustainable* tourism. However, this is not mandatory. For those who do not have such a background, we recommend to complete an online course developed for this purpose by the Erasmus+ project "ICT for Sustainable Tourism Development" in which Eberswalde University was actively involved.

<u>Prior to course</u>: A set of core documents has been compiled along with a short description of each document that students are expected to read beforehand to familiarize themselves with the topics of the summer school (see separate document on reading assignments).

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#### **Examination task**

Form groups of two to three students (not all from the same country) and do the following:

- Brainstorm a sustainable tourism project that you would like to develop. This could be
   a) a cross-border project of neighbouring countries, e.g. a bicycle route or a cultural route;
   b) an international network of similar tourism companies (e.g. SMEs) or destinations (e.g. in
   mountain or coastal areas) working together on a common project, e.g. innovative product
   development or sustainability certification.
- 2. What makes this project sustainable and is it in line with sustainability goals, policies or strategies of the EU? If so, which ones?
- 3. What type of (financial) support is needed to implement your project? Please identify one or several potential funding programmes.

Prepare a ppt presentation of 20-25 min. (groups of two) or 30-40 min. (groups of three). This will be followed by 5-10 min. of questions by the examiners.

You will receive a group grade, which may be individually adjusted if individual performances in the group differ significantly.
